The Senior Christian Endeavor of the Eastmont Reformed church invites everyone from the ACE area to attend this inspiring service.

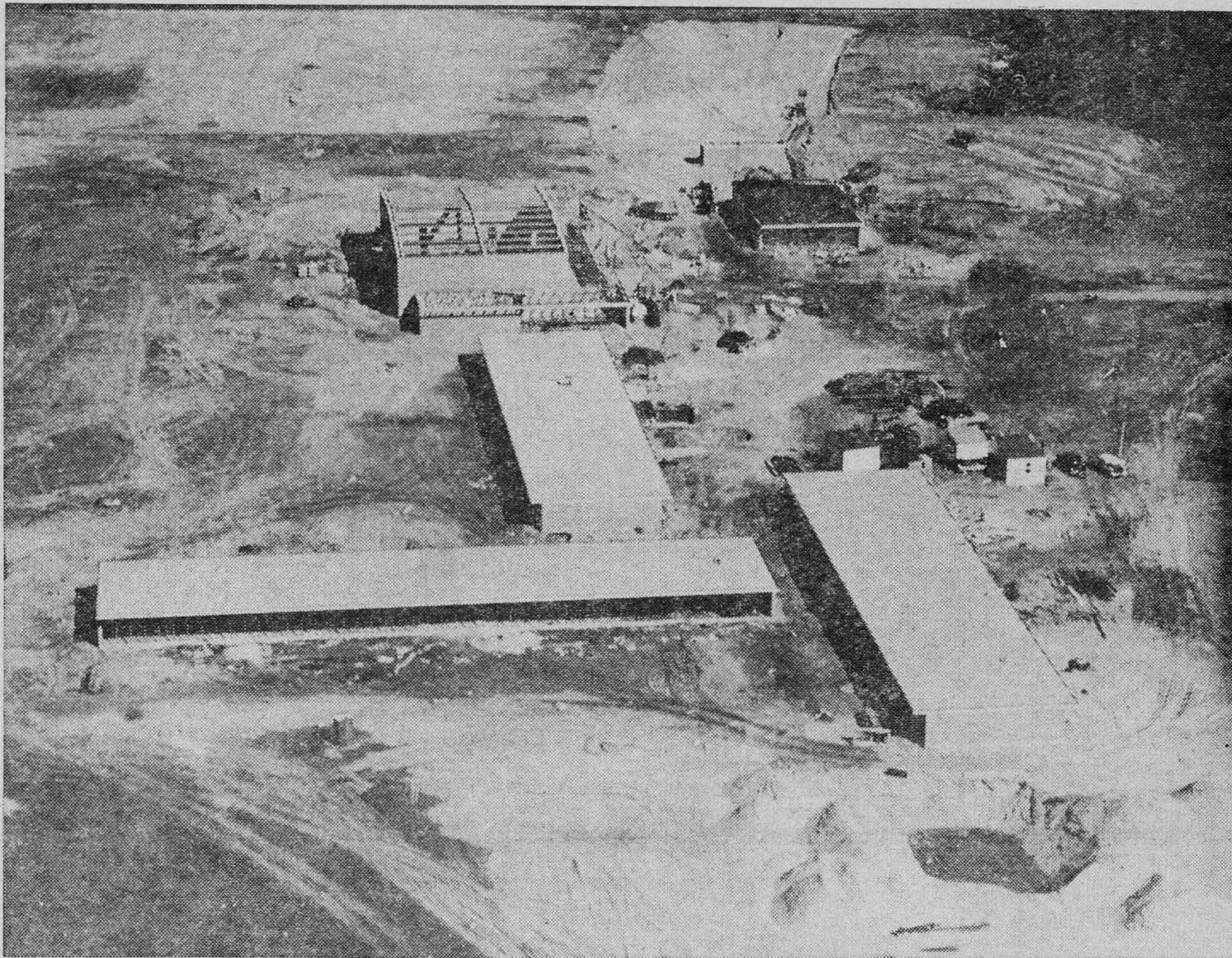
Scouts to Participate In Safety Good Turn

Begin Spring Tree Planting

Kent County landowners are starting their spring tree planting for reforestation, erosion control and farm windbreaks.

Last year 687 acres were planted at the rate of approximately 1000 trees per acre. The lands planted were mostly steep hill-sides, drouthy and infertile fields, or other odd areas not suited to agricultural production. Reforesting these areas with suitable species of trees puts them into production again and assures a future income from the sale of forest products such as pulp wood, cabin poles, fence posts and saw-logs. Some of the plantings are being managed by pruning and spraying to produce a crop of Christmas trees.

Properly planned plantings also increase the population of desirable wildlife by providing cover for nesting sites and escape from predators.

Kenneth Anderson of Ada, forestry chairman of the Northeast Kent Soil Conservation District, reports that trees are still available from the district as well as from many private nurseries. Species of trees include red pine, Austrian pine, and Scotch pine, as well as Multiflora rose shrubs for living fences and wildlife food and cover.

The Kent County ASC Committee reports that cost-sharing is still available at the rate of \$2 per hundred trees for field planting and \$3 per hundred trees planted for farm windbreaks.

Mechanical tree planters may be contracted to do the planting where several thousand trees are to be planted on one farm.

Additional information on how to plant, what to plant, and where to obtain trees may be secured by calling or writing the U. S. Soil Conservation Service, Rockford, Michigan, phone VO 6-2501.

Your Washington Review

The House of Representatives has approved the \$4 billion Department of Agriculture appropriation bill for the fiscal year beginning July 1st which contains a number of items of interest such as the funds for Agricultural Research Service. This organization which has the job of finding more uses for our farm products and more economical methods of commodity production, will have a budget of over \$58 million. It is interesting to point out that research funds for the Department of Agriculture have increased 7 percent since 1952. Research in agriculture will pay big dividends just as it has on satellites and missiles.

The Soil Conservation Service is another excellent program which has many enthusiastic friends in Kent and Ottawa Counties. The SCS conservation operations budget for next year will be almost \$75 million. The House Committee on Appropriations increased funds for this program to assure sufficient soil conservation technicians to staff existing SCS districts properly and provide technical assistance to the 70 new districts which will be established in 1958 and 1959. All our citizens benefit when constructive conservation practices are followed on our farms.

AGRICULTURAL LEGISLATION: The Senate Committee on Agriculture has concluded a week of hearings on the House-approved bill to prohibit trading in onion futures on the Commodity Exchange. Nearly a score of onion growers from western Michigan testified at the hearings.

On March 27th the Congress concluded action on a conference report on H. R. 10343 which will correct the unfair situation involving certain Ottawa County farmers and resulting from the designation of that county as a commercial corn area. When this legislation becomes law those farmers who signed wheat acreage agreements will not be required to comply with the 1958 corn allotments in order to collect soil bank payments. The designation of Ottawa as the "new corn county" came after such wheat contracts had been signed. I have written the White House urging Presidential approval of this bill. It will correct an inequity but not cut out those farmers who have signed the corn acreage agreement.

OBSCENE MATERIAL: Recent mail has indicated a marked interest in H. R. 6239, a bill to provide fines or imprisonment for those who use the mails for delivering obscene or crime-inciting matter. This bill has been approved by a subcommittee and is awaiting action by the full Committee on the Judiciary.

I recently wrote Chairman Emanuel Celler that this legislation by other means than

through the mails. If the power of the Federal Government is to be most effective in halting the flow of obscene and crime-inciting publications, the shipment in interstate commerce by any means of transportation must be regulated.

In his reply, Chairman Celler stated that the full Committee will consider an amendment along that line. He also expressed the hope that the Committee would act on this bill before the Easter recess. This is good news and you may be certain that I will continue to give 100 percent support to this needed and worthwhile legislation.

SCHOLASTIC RECOGNITION: I was extremely pleased to learn that two of the four boys from the Fifth District at the U. S. Military Academy at West Point were "on the Dean's list" for the first semester just concluded. This means that these cadets ranked within the upper 30 percent of their class in all academic subjects and had no subject average less than 2,200 out of a possible 3,000. The honored cadets are David MacAulay of Grand Rapids and Rodney A. Bartholomew of Nunica.

The announcement of the National Science Foundation issued in March revealed that four men from Kent and Ottawa Counties had received Foundation fellowships for the next academic year. Two will take advanced work in mathematics, one in chemistry, and the other in physics. They are Ward Bouwsma, Alex Dragt, and Frederic Nelson of Grand Rapids, and Ronald Hamelink of Holland. Congratulations!

WITH THE COMMITTEES: The Committee on Foreign Affairs continues its hearings on the Mutual Security Program. . . . Post Office isolation had not only my personal endorsement but also the support of the people of the Fifth District. In my letter I urged that the bill's provisions be enlarged to include shipments in interstate commerce and Civil Service resumed hearings on legislation providing for recognition of organizations of pos-

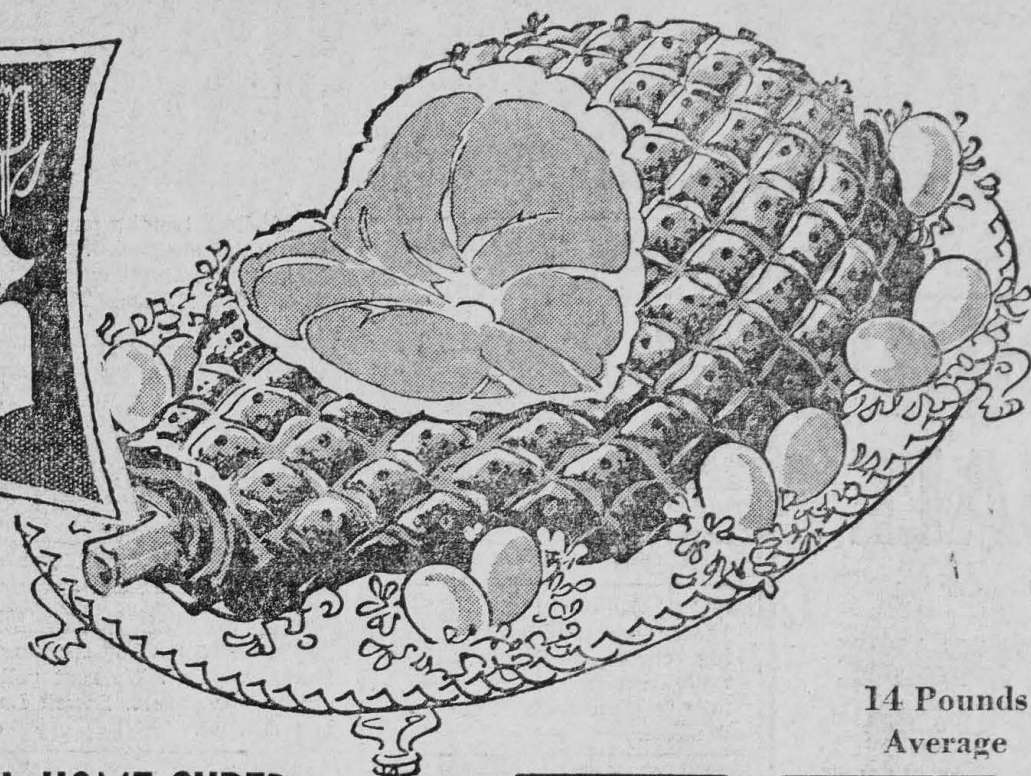

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Regulations For Radiation Passed

State regulations that protect the general public and specialized workers against over-exposure to ionizing radiation have been adopted by the state health commissioner, approved by the Council of Health and made a part of the state administrative code.

Dr. Albert E. Heustis, state health commissioner, said the regulations "apply to all persons who receive, possess or use materials or devices capable of emitting ionizing radiation."

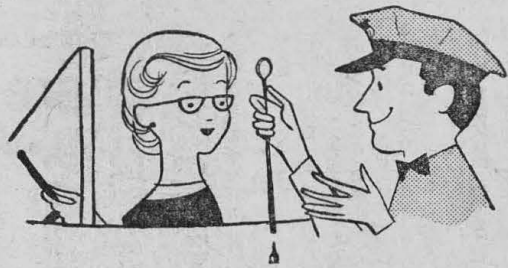
Industrial, dental and medical users of radiation materials are covered by the regulations, which will be administered by the Michigan Department of Health.

"Nothing in the regulations," Dr. Heustis explained, "should be

interpreted as limiting the intentional exposure of patients to radiation for medical diagnosis, medical therapy or medical research."

The health commissioner added that several hundred radiation devices have been routinely checked by the state health department during the last 10 years and that the new standards for the design, installation and operation of radiation equipment are similar to the ones the department has been following informally for the last decade.

Under the new regulations, all sources of ionizing radiation including X-ray machines must be registered with the state health department. Owners of radiation equipment can obtain registration forms by writing to the Michigan Department of Health, Lansing 4.

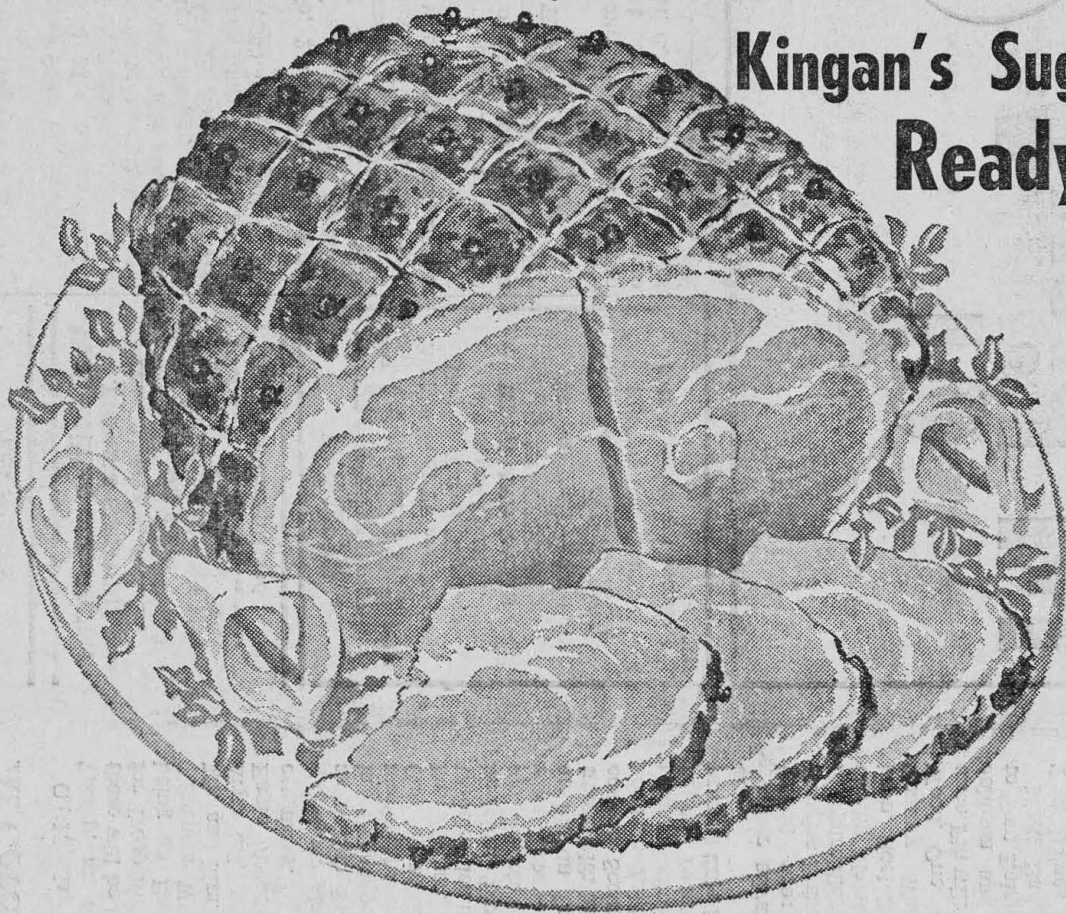

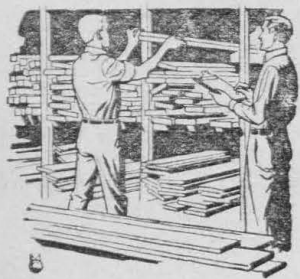

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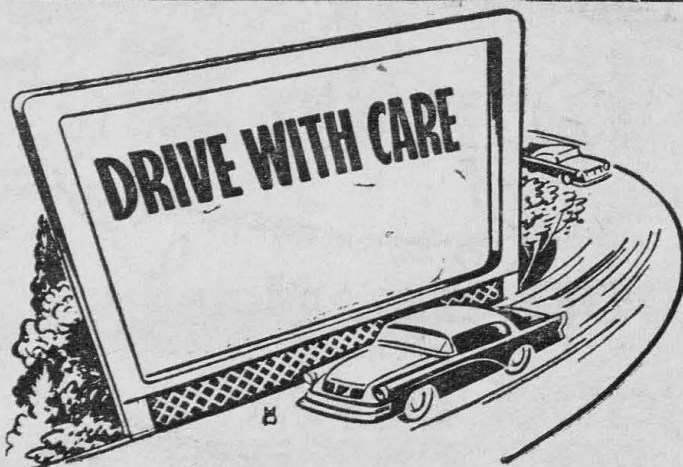

The boys need not bring birth certificates on this date but will be notified later about when to bring them.

Six Teams

It was reported that close to 150 boys have already signed up to play, so the Board of Directors voted to establish the sixth team in the league. They are now looking for a sponsor for this team. The franchise only permits a six-team league, so it begins to look as if the minor league will be as large as the major league. The first practice as reported before is for boys 9 through 12.

There will be minor league practice called later for the 8-year-olds and for those boys who will play in the minors.

Something should be said about equipment, uniforms, etc. The Thornapple Little League furnishes uniforms, balls, bats and catchers equipment. All expenses for these items come out of the general treasury. The only items that the boys must furnish are their ball gloves and shoes. The minor league players are not furnished uniforms but play in their own everyday clothes.

The boys can participate in tennis shoes or baseball shoes with rubber spikes. Steel spikes are not permissible in Little League competition.

Sewage Systems Should Be Checked

With the coming of spring and the condition of the ground returning to normal from winter's freeze, there are some things we should check, says Mr. Stockton, City-County Director of Sanitation.

This time of year offers a fine opportunity to those whose sewage systems are maintained by septic tanks.

Septic tanks must be cleaned occasionally, explained Mr. Stockton. The recommended time for cleaning is once in three years. Occasionally new tanks do not start functioning properly and may require checking sooner.

All systems will plug up in time. The time is dependent upon the manner in which the family uses the sewage system. The more solids, such as coffee grounds and garbage that is put into the system, the sooner the septic tanks must be cleaned out.

The solids from the sewage accumulate at an average rate of eleven gallons per person per year, Mr. Stockton explained. If septic tanks are not cleaned, the solids will pass into the tile field or drainage system and plug it up. If the solids are removed in time, you will prevent the costly rebuilding of the tile field or drainage system.

All septic tank cleaners in the county must be licensed and bonded by the Michigan Department of Health and display a decal from this department. Mr. Stockton advises for you to be sure that your septic tank cleaner is so licensed. A licensed cleaner will advise, after an examination of your septic tank, whether it should be cleaned or continue operating as it is for a while longer. A list of septic tank cleaners is available from the Kent County Health Department upon request.

Mr. Stockton concludes advising that if you have any doubt about your septic tank or your sewage system call the Kent County Health Department for advice. If you are planning to put in a new system or an addition to the current one, it must be in compliance with the Kent County Sanitary Code. The Health Department can help you with this problem also.

It should include some fruit or juice, especially for Vitamin C; some bread or cereal, for energy and vitamin B; some protein, such as eggs or bacon; and milk, as a beverage or on cereal.

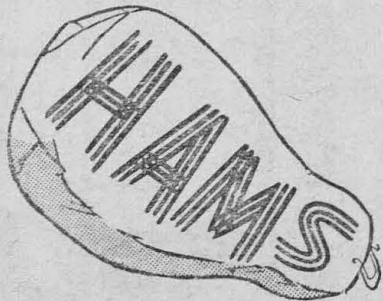
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
